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#### **POLICY RECOMMENDATIONS**

The National Literacy Trust's recent data reveals an alarming drop in reading habits among today's youth, with a mere 26% of those under 18 engaging in daily reading - the lowest in over a decade. Spearheading efforts to combat this trend is the Erasmus+ 'Improve' project, spanning seven European nations.

Aiming to influence key stakeholders capable of reversing this decline, the project provides recommendations tailored for schools, local municipalities, and ministries of education in each associated country.

In collaboration with our esteemed partners, we've crafted **ten policy recommendations** to bolster reading engagement among youth. These insights, rooted in two years of dedicated research within the IMPROVE initiative, are accessible on our project website and have been translated into seven languages, including Spanish, Portuguese, Macedonian, Italian, Belgian, Turkish, and Slovenian.
